Utica dates back to the late 1700s and has a rich legacy in manufacturing, engineering, and agriculture.

You don't have to go very far to find history in the City of Utica. This state-of-the-art venue you're sitting in was constructed next to the site of one of the United States' most significant engineering marvels. The Erie Canal opened in 1825 and flowed through present day Oriskany Street from Albany to Buffalo, opening trade to the west by connecting New York City to the Great Lakes. Walk a couple blocks to the east and you can see Mechanics Hall, the site of an 1857 antislavery conference and 1863 Civil War draft.

Head over to the west side and have a cold one in the biergarten at Saranac Brewery, the nation's fourth oldest family-operated brewery.

Innovation in Utica didn't end with the Union Suit; Utica is home to the Masonic Medical Research Institute, an internationally recognized biomedical research center. Mohawk Valley Health System just completed the Wynn Hospital, the newest in New York State. In the neighboring Town of Marcy, Wolfspeed recently built the world's first, largest, and only 200mm Silicon Carbide fabrication facility. Chances are, their microchips are found in the car in your garage, the lightbulbs in your house, and the phone in your hand.

While we know you are a sports fan, we hope you enjoy many of our other favorite activities while you are here!

Do you enjoy dining out? Whether you're an adventurous eater or prefer comfort food, our long tradition of embracing the heritage of our citizens has led to epicurean entrepreneurship. Sample Laotian, Dominican, Lebanese, Vietnamese, Yemeni, Polish, Italian, and more. Don't miss the "Utica trinity" of chicken riggies, tomato pie, and greens! Top it off with a halfmoon for dessert!

Do you love art? If so, you can't miss out on a self-guided tour of Munson & Fountain Elms, or a visit to the subversive Sculpture Space.

Does architecture pique your interest? We've got examples from some of the premier architects of the 19th and 20th centuries including Richard Upjohn and Phillip Johnson.

Did you bring your kids? They'll enjoy a trip to the Utica Zoo or hands-on New York Power Authority Energy Zone. The City of Utica also boasts an extensive park system with of a total 677 acres of municipally owned and operated parkland. Traditional landscape architecture is on full display at F.T. Proctor Park, designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, Jr., while at T.R. Proctor Park kids of all abilities can play on the area's largest inclusive playground, located next to the new skate park and pump track.





The International Ice Hockey Federation staged the first Women's World Hockey Championship back in 1990 in Ottawa, Ontario, and it was held intermittently through the 1990s until becoming an annual event in 1999 following the success of women's ice hockey in its Olympic debut at the 1998 Games in Nagano, Japan.

EVOLUTION

The world championship tournament expanded from eight to 10 teams in 2019. Starting in 2022, the event will be played in Olympic years where previously the Olympic tournament was thought of as the world championship.

NORTH AMERICAN DOMINANCE

The IIHF Women's World Championship has been dominated by the United States and Canada.

Canada won the first eight women's worlds before the U.S. took home its first gold medal in the event in 2005 thanks to Angela Ruggerio's decisive shootout goal in a 1-0 victory over Canada in the gold-medal game.

The U.S. won eight of nine world titles between 2008-2019, while Canada captured titles in 2021 and 2022 and the U.S. earned the most recent gold medal last year in Brampton, Ontario.

MEDAL LEADERS

All total heading into the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship, which

is the 23rd all-time, the U.S. is the only team to appear in every gold-medal game and has 10 golds and 12 silvers to its credit. Canada has the most gold medals with 12, with nine silvers and one bronze. Finland is next with 14 medals, including one silver and 13 bronze.



USA Hockey has hosted the IIHF Women's World Championship just four times previously with this year's tournament marking the second time New York has been the host state.



1994 – LAKE PLACID, NEW YORK

Canada won the world championship after a 6-3 win over the U.S. in the gold-medal game on April 17, while Finland downed China by an 8-1 count to earn bronze. The tournament was staged at the Olympic Center, where the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team beat the Soviet Union in the historic Miracle on Ice game. Team USA's Erin Whitten was named the tournament's top netminder. Karyn Bye (6G, 6A) and Cammi Granato (5G, 7A) were Team USA's leading point getters.

2001 - MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA

With a 3-2 victory over the U.S. in the gold-medal game on April 8 at Mariucci Arena, Canada won its seventh straight world championship. Russia beat Finland, 2-1, in the bronze medal contest. The tournament was played in six different cities in Minnesota with Plymouth, Rochester, St. Cloud, Blaine, and Fridley, joining Minneapolis. Team USA's Karyn Bye was named the top forward in the tournament.



2012 - BURLINGTON, VERMONT

While the U.S. earned a 9-2 win over Canada in preliminary round play, the Canadians rallied for a 5-4 victory in overtime in the gold-medal game on April 14 to win the world championship. Switzerland beat Finland, 6-2, for bronze. The University of Vermont's fabled Gutterhouse Fieldhouse served as the lead competition venue. Kelli Stack of Team USA earned honors as the best forward in the tournament. Monique Lamoureux-Kolls topped the U.S. in points (7G, 7A).

2017 - PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP, MICHIGAN


At USA Hockey Arena on April 7, the U.S. won its first-ever women's world championship on home soil with Hilary Knight's overtime goal in the gold-medal game against Canada sending the U.S. to a 3-2 victory and the sold-out crowd into boisterous U-S-A chants. In the bronze medal game, Finland blanked Germany, 8-0, Team USA's Brianna Decker was



named the top forward in the tournament. The U.S. had the top three point-getters in the world championship, including Decker (3G, 9A), Kendall Coyne (5G, 7A) and Knight (4G, 5A).

PARTICIPATING COUNTRIES





Face-Offs: This is the method by which the puck is put into play. During a face-off, one player from each team lines up to face each other at one of the rink's nine face-off spots. The referee or linesman drops the puck between the players, who then battle for possession.

Offsides: This occurs when a player enters the offensive zone before the puck. It results in a stoppage of play and neutral zone faceoff.

Icing: When a defending player sends the puck, untouched, from behind the center red line across the opposing team's goal line in the offensive zone. This results in a stoppage of play and a faceoff in the offending team's defensive zone.

Hand Pass: Players in hockey are not allowed to play the puck with their hand outside of their defensive zone. When a player moves the puck to a teammate with their hand, the official blows the whistle, and there is a faceoff at the position where the puck was passed from. At no time can players close their hand on the puck.

High Stick: When the puck is played out of mid-air by a player whose stick is above shoulder height and a teammate is the next to touch the puck, a high stick infraction is called, resulting in a face off in that team's defensive zone.

Minor Penalties: Players can be assessed penalties for improper conduct on the ice. The most common penalties are minor penalties, in which players must sit in the penalty box for two minutes, or until the other teams scores, while their team plays shorthanded. Some of the most common minors are listed in the next column.

Tripping: Player uses stick, arm, or leg to take an opponent's feet out from under them.

High-Sticking: Striking an opponent with the stick above shoulder level.

Slashing: The act of swinging a player's stick at an opponent, whether contact is made or not.

Holding: Player holds an opponent by using their hands, arms, or legs.

Interference: Player interferes with or impedes the progress of an opponent who is not in possession of the puck.

Elbowing: Involves the use of an extended elbow to perform an illegal body check.

Cross-Checking: A check made with the stick while both hands are on the stick and arms extending to deliver the hit.

Hooking: Using the stick in a manner that enables a player to restrain an opponent, typically through a pulling motion.

Boarding: Checking an opponent in such a manner that causes the opponent to be thrown violently into the boards.

Roughing: Involves the use of unnecessary roughness during play or between whistles.

Major Penalties: Major penalties are assessed for many of the same infractions that apply to minor penalties except they involve a greater degree of deliberate severity that can result in injury. The player who is serving the five-minute major must stay in the penalty box for the full five minute penalty time, regardless if a goal is scored on the "shorthanded" team.
